## Time to Care

Ontario long-term care residents receive less care from less staff than just about anywhere elsewhere in Canada.

The majority of long-term care residents are over 85-years old with complex medical conditions, including many with dementia. They need help with feeding, bathing, toileting and getting out of bed. Most are not mobile.

Ontario long-term care residents need more daily care to live with dignity.

### What needs to change?

- 1. Ontario MPPs need to pass legislation (Bill 33 Time to Care Act) that would give residents a minimum of 4 hours of direct care each day;
- 2. Public funding for long-term care homes must be tied to the provision of quality care and staffing levels that meet the legislated minimum care standard of 4 hours;
- 3. Make reporting of staffing levels at each Ontario long-term care home mandatory;
- Immediately provide funding for specialized facilities for persons with cognitive impairment who have been assessed as potentially aggressive, and staff them with sufficient numbers of appropriately trained workers;
- The province must stop closing hospital complex continuing care beds and alternative level of care beds to end the downloading of hospital patients with complex medical conditions to longterm care homes.
