Historic election of new executive board

Last year, members voted to create a new, more inclusive CUPE Ontario executive board.

Following a historic vote at the last Convention, this year marks the first time CUPE Ontario members will vote for a newly restructured and more inclusive executive board.

Be sure to attend the allcandidates forum scheduled on adjournment on Wednesday to hear from candidates for many executive board positions. The president, secretarytreasurer, four vice-presidents, six members-at-large and one trustee are elected by all delegates on the convention floor on Thursday and Friday.

Several positions are elected in caucus during convention, including representatives for Northern Ontario, women, pink triangle, workers with disabilities, racialized workers and young workers. Check the agenda for times. The first election caucuses are on Wedensday evening.

The executive board also includes representatives from each sector, who are elected at sectoral conferences rather than at Convention.

Delegates will also elect one trustee to a three-year term.
