Social Services Levies

The Bylaws of the Social Service Workers Coordinating Committee (SSWCC) allow for the collection of a levy of two dollars per member per year. This levy has allowed the committee to enter into ambitious work plans within the Social Service Sector to address the challenges our members face.

The Bylaws for the Developmental Services Sector Coordinating Committee (DSSCC – formerly the ACLBC) allow for the collection of a levy of two dollars per member per year. The Developmental Service sector has made important gains through coordinated bargaining.

While both levies are voluntary, the coordinated efforts in the social services sector rely on having the necessary resources in place. f you deliver vital social services to Ontarians in their local communities, you could be one of CUPE's 2000 Community Agencies members. We have members in 170 locals working in social service organizations and community-based agencies across the province.

Too often, members working in Community Agencies don't identify with this area of our sector. You might work for a municipality, be part of a unit in a large composite local, and deliver settlement programs for newcomers to Canada. Maybe you provide children's mental health services, teach employment skills or run programs for youth and older people in local community centres. But the issues that affect you, your work and your community are represented by your Community Agencies representatives on the Social Service Workers Coordinating Committee (SSWCC).

And if you're a community agency worker, we want to get to know you better!

Why identify as a CUPE Community Agencies member?

Workers in community agencies face unique and particular labour issues. Most of the workers in our sector are women; jobs can be low-paid and/or precarious. Many members also work for agencies that offer project-based employment or that are easy targets for funding cuts or freezes.

CUPE's Community Agencies representatives seek to tackle these issues through action on:

- ✓ strong pay-equity agreements:
- ✓ lobbying for greater agency funding;
- √ bargaining pensions for community agencies workers;
- ✓ tackling precarious work issues.

Your Community Agencies representatives are here to look after your interests.



Which CUPE member is a Community Agencies member?

You are a Community Agencies member if your agency's funded by

- ✓ Ontario government ministries (Community and Social Services; Health; Training, Colleges and Universities; Children and Youth; Education; and Citizenship and Immigration)
- federal funding (Industry Canada and Citizenship and Immigration Canada)
- municipal, United Way and project-based funding.

What's on the agenda at Community Agencies?

Recent changes in United Way funding have increased the number of precarious and temporary jobs in community agencies. These changes also increase the prospects of layoffs, pay freezes and job losses for CUPE members. In Ottawa and Toronto, funding cycles have been reduced from five to three years for certain "anchor" agencies, while other agencies receive only project funding. We have also seen a shift to target- or outcome-based funding, as United Way priorities change from year to year and money is funneled to these projects instead of longstanding programs.

CUPE's Community Agencies want to know how this new funding structure is affecting your members. Has the issue been raised in bargaining? Is there pressure to create more temporary positions?
