

STUDENTS CAN'T EVEN WORK & SAVE TO PAY FOR TUITION FEES

When Premier McGuinty attended law school in 1980, he could have worked 40 hours a week over the summer at minimum wage to pay his fees.

\$3.50/hour minimum wage \$698 in law tuition fees

= 5 weeks of work

If Premier McGuinty attended the University of Toronto law school in the fall of 2008, he could work at a minimum wage job all year and still not afford his tuition fees.

\$8.75/hour minimum wage \$20,155 in law tuition fees

= 58 weeks of work
